









– On Thursday, 5th inst., as Mr William
Rees, a boy aged between 14 and 15, was
returning with his master’s wagon with
a load of lime from the Black Mountain,
between the above place and Llangadog,
the unfortunate boy fell under the
wheels of the wagon and he was killed
on the spot. D. Thomas
